

In February of 2023, I started in my role as the Executive Director of Toward Zero Waste (TZW). Reviewing all our accomplishments this year, confirms that our strong volunteer team is working together to reach our goal of promoting waste-conscious living through education, inspiration, and action.

The TZW team continued the mission of education to community members by organizing a tour of the Multi-Material Recycling Facility, used by the City of Raleigh and run by the Sonoco company. The event was attended by 25 people who learned about proper recycling from the City of Raleigh Sustainable Outreach Coordinator. Another educational event arranged by TZW was a night with Perfectly Good Food cookbook authors Mei Li and Irene Li. The Cary business Mindful Merchant provided their storefront for the event, and everyone learned delicious recipes to make with food scraps.

In hopes of inspiring individuals to be a part of the waste diversion process, TZW facilitated the public-private collaboration between Kane Realty's Events Department and the Wake County Environmental Services Department to provide a compost drop-off site at the Midtown Farmers' Summer Market at North Hills shopping center in Raleigh. The program kicked off in April and continued until the first weekend of November. Toward Zero Waste volunteers provided compost program education to the market customers by working at a table frequently during market hours.

To fulfill the action part of our mission, I had the opportunity to work with North Carolina Representative Julie Von Haefen to write House Bill 679 titled Skip the Stuff. The bill was filed at NC General Assembly April 18th, 2023 where it immediately was referred to the Rules Committee. Unfortunately, it remained with that committee until the end of the session.

The year of 2023 was full of growth and development for Toward Zero Waste. I am confident that the organization will continue to work together to further our mission in the new year.
